PROJECT UPDATE

It is with great pleasure that I write this project update following a period of delay.

I am very pleased to report that the Scottish Government approved the Full Business Case in September 2020 and then in October we entered into the Stage 4 construction contract with partner's GRAHAM Construction, our Principal Supply Chain Partner (PSCP).

During the run up to the Christmas break, a programme of site mobilisation activities got underway, with construction activities scheduled to commence for the Baird Family Hospital in January and the ANCHOR Centre in February 2021.

During the first six months the main works will be 'piling' on both sites. *Piling – heavy stakes/posts installed to support the foundations of a building's superstructure.* The images below are of the piling work starting on the Baird site.







During the summer and autumn of 2021 the focus of works on both sites will be the creation of the concrete structure and also the steel structure at the ANCHOR site.

Arrangements to ensure safe movement of patients, visitors, staff and construction staff

and vehicles are also being put in place. This includes some changes to site access for public vehicles, pedestrians and emergency vehicles (covered later in newsletter).

Additionally, the PSCP and Project Team members meet weekly with clinical services that are adjacent to the construction sites to discuss forthcoming works and any issues of concern including healthcare associated infection issues, dust and noise management etc.

The project communication strategy has recently been updated for the construction phase of the project. The team are putting arrangements in place to ensure good communication with all stakeholders, especially while all of the COVID restrictions continue to be in place.

This newsletter and future editions will keep you updated with construction, commissioning and preparations for bringing in to operation, with the ANCHOR Centre due to open in May 2023 and the Baird Family Hospital in December 2023. Thereafter the current Aberdeen Maternity Hospital will be demolished during the first half of 2024.

Baird and ANCHOR Site Progress

On Monday 4th January 2021 construction works finally commenced on the Baird and ANCHOR Project. Since then a number of changes have taken place.

The pedestrian footpath leading into the site from the Foresterhill Road junction towards the Emergency Department (ED) and The Royal Aberdeen Children's Hospital (RACH) has been moved. This is to allow piling works to take place in that location. Some changes have also taken place to the roads around the Baird site; a one way system is now operational on the road which leads from the Foresterhill Road junction, past the front of RACH, finishing before the entrance into the RACH carpark. This also means that the road beyond the RACH carpark is now a No Entry and is closed to all traffic. For more information and maps for pedestrian and vehicle access please follow this link

For those who have been on the campus you may have noticed a lot of heavy equipment has been delivered to the Baird site. These include piling rigs, mobile cranes, earth moving equipment and excavators. One of the first activities to be carried out is the installation of a number of guide walls, these guide walls are circular in shape and cast concrete into the ground. These guide walls are cast in place to ensure that the piling rigs rotary screw is 'guided' into the ground and kept straight, concreting of the foundations can take place thereafter. The piling work starts in January and will be ongoing until July 2021.

The Baird site fencing/hoarding panels adjacent to Foresterhill Road are being moved this month. This will result in the pedestrian footpath on this side of the road having to close and pedestrians will have to use the footpath on the other side of Foresterhill Road. A zebra crossing is being



installed on Foresterhill Road beside the junction leading to the Emergency Department, this will allow pedestrians to cross back across the road towards ED and RACH should they wish. More information coming soon.

Due to the onset of the COVID pandemic permission was sought by the main contractor, GRAHAM Construction to establish additional welfare and office facilities in the location of the redundant play park. After a number of consultations with various NHS Grampian stakeholders,

permission was granted. The old equipment was removed and excavations carried out to level the site and the units have now arrived.

At present there is very little activity taking place on the ANCHOR site, the exception being deliveries of materials and site survey's. This is due largely to the activities that are taking place on Baird as well as the works that were required to install the one way system and associated signage. Works on ANCHOR will start in earnest during February 2021.
